Have you noticed the beautiful fall colors of the SSC campus? Some of the bright red trees may be red maple (*Acer rubrum*). You can identify a red maple by looking to see if it has three points and saw like leaf edges.

Fall Cleanup

If you enjoy fireflies (lightning bugs) and butterflies you should definitely be keeping leaves in your yard over the winter. Keeping leaves in your yard will benefit birds that come to your yard looking for insects that live in leaves to feed their babies in the spring. There has been a decrease of billions of birds over the years, so anything you can do to help birds is a real benefit. The best thing to do with your leaves is to mulch them with a mower. If you do have to rake because there are too many leaves, the best thing to do is put them around a tree or in flower bed as a mulch.
